A CHAT WITH Tunku Iskandar

LIVING TO EAT

Food is an intrinsic part of life as there is no doubt we need nourishment to be able to live. However we so often hear of the flip-side expressed as "live to eat". Virginia Woolf wrote in her 1929 essay 'A Room of One's Own', "One cannot think well, love well, sleep well, if one has not dined well."

The Islamic month of Ramadan that has just ended demonstrates how we sometimes forget the objective of fasting from sunrise to sunset. Self-discipline, making sacrifices and instilling empathy with the poor and needy are originally part of the raison d'être of the annual fast. In some affluent societies, this is often forgotten and the abundance of food consumed at iftar or the breaking of fast at sunset, and feasting after the end of Ramadan at Hari Raya open houses is sadly the case.

In Malaysia, as in many parts of the world, love for food is a cultural cornerstone. Food binds families, society and even nations together. Was it any surprise that Malaysians were aghast when an online guide for traditional food listed curry laksa as hailing from Singapore? Netizens from Malaysia condemned the veracity of this, accusing the guide as being biased against Malaysia.

This was just one example of the so-called usurping of Malaysia's supposed food dominance in South East Asia, following similar incidents with other food items such as satay and chicken rice. Malaysians have themselves been at the sharp end of similar criticism from Indonesians who regard their saté as being the real thing and the Malaysian satay is a poor copy. Nonetheless, I for one will make the Indonesian nasi goreng istimewa my first meal (fried rice with a fried egg sunny-side-up and 2 sticks of saté) whenever I visit Indonesia.

Perhaps we often forget that culture has no political or national boundaries and that culture transgresses borders as social networks broaden within a region with migration.

One obscure example is when the Portuguese sailed to Africa, India, SouthEast Asia and North Asia in the 16th century, they brought along the way dishes from Mozambique, to Goa and on to Malacca and Macao. Today you can find African Chicken on the menus of restaurants in these past Portuguese colonies.

Yee Sang, a dish that is popular in Malaysia and Singapore at Chinese New Year especially amongst the Chinese populace was not brought by immigrants who came from various parts of China since the mid-19th century. It was actually created by the grandfather of Malaysia's present Minister of Transport Anthony Loke. A fierce food feud ensued in 2012 when there was an attempt to claim yee sang on UNESCO's Intangible Cultural Heritage list as Singaporean!
