MINDING OUR PS & QS

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American rapper Lil Uzi Vert used "Ps and Qs" as the title for one of his singles, reminding himself to be on his best behaviour with his lady. Indeed this is the popular meaning of "Ps & Qs" today, which to mind your manners and to be polite as well as to be careful not to offend someone else, especially one's elders or superiors.

However, there does not seem any consensus about the origins of these two letters, "P" and "Q" and what they actually mean pertaining to manners! One popular theory is that in the old days printers would remind their apprentices to be careful of which letter they use on typesetting machines as the lower-case "p" and "q" are very similar and apt to be mixed up. There also appears to be another theory of the origins of the phrase which involves pints and quarts of ale served in public houses or pubs in England.

Whatever the origins, today its use mostly pertains to the phrase "Mind your Ps and Qs" reminding us to mind our manners, something that we in Asia are very conscious of in all our interactions. Take for example, when we enter the house we would remove our shoes, as is the accepted courtesy in most Asian homes. Such manners are ingrained in our personae since our childhood when we are reminded to kiss the hand of our elders when introduced to them.

Politeness in European or North American culture is on a different plane and may vary too in different levels of society and while there may be no intention to be rude, Asians may sometimes feel that the "Ps & Qs" of those cultures are lacking in delicacy. Unfamiliarity with Asian culture may also be regarded by those in "the West" as Asian being over-polite with the Japanese custom of bowing is one such possible example.

The erosion of Ps & Qs was lamented very recently by HRH Sultan Nazrin of Perak who believes that courtesy includes politeness in communication as it reflects the intellect and character of an individual. He was lamenting the harsh, vulgar, slanderous, disparaging, and insulting language often publicly voiced without hesitation, and sometimes with pride and arrogance by even highly educated, high-ranking, and titled individuals. To that end, he urged that the Fifth Principle of the Rukun Negara (National Principles), 'Courtesy and Morality' is infused into education programmes to ensure Malaysians are not influenced by uncivilised behaviours with incorrect values, and the principles are understood, internalised, and practised by the community.

'Manners maketh man' is the motto of Winchester College as well as New College in Oxford, both founded by William Horman of Wykeham in the 16th century which emphasises that politeness, good manners and civility are essential to humanity and that being respectful, considerate, and polite to others is just as important as our skills, abilities, and accomplishments.

I personally believe we should follow the advice from Irish author and essayist Jonathan Swift who said, "Good manners is the art of making those people easy with whom we converse. Whoever makes the fewest people uneasy is the best bred in the room".


Business English Training for Mazars Malaysia
