When Carole King recorded her 2nd album in 1971 and named it "Tapestry", she probably did not realise that the word tapestry has its origins from Old French, tapis, which was itself derived from Latin tapetis and having its origins from Greek tapētos, meaning "carpet" or "rug".



There is an abundance of foreign words that have integrated into the English language such that they have become indispensable parts of the English language tapestry. The English language is fascinating, enriched by the contributions of countless cultures and tongues from around the globe.

While its roots have Anglo-Saxon and Germanic origins, the English has become a dynamic and versatile language, with words from diverse backgrounds. There are so many words having foreign origins that have been woven into the fabric of the language thereby enriching it.

William Shakespeare certainly acknowledged the influence of foreign words in his plays, where he often used words borrowed from other languages, particularly Latin, Greek, French, and Italian. This reflects the dynamic nature of language and how it evolves through contact with other cultures.

One of the strongest influences on English vocabulary comes from Latin, having its origins from Roman Empire conquests resulting in Latin taking on the role as the language of scholars and administrators throughout Europe. Words such as "alibi," and "agenda" have been regarded as integral to English discourse, whereas have their legacy from ancient Rome. We often throw in Latin phrases like "ad hoc," "per se," and "vice versa" making our discourse seem more scholarly.

However we also interweave our conversations with French words and phrases like haute cuisine and haute couture, whereby such terms seem to lend sophistication and words like "rendezvous," "faux pas," and "deja vu" have been integrated into everyday speech and we do not anymore think of the origins. Whilst less prevalent, German has been brought into everyday English usage such as "kindergarten" to "delicatessen," and some words we use so often such as "noodle" and "hamburger".

It is interesting that the Arabic language has been incorporated into English especially scientific words such as "algebra" and "algorithm," and not to forget that "coffee" which is a word used internationally, (supposedly English or American) actually has its roots in the Turkish and Arabic languages. The Orient bring many contributions to the English vocabulary, especially in cuisine, martial arts, and spirituality, such as "kung fu", "yoga", "zen", "curry" and "sushi" have insinuated into the English language to become household words in English-speaking countries, reflecting the global influence of Asian culture.

Perhaps the reason that English is regarded as the "Language of International Communication" is because of its adaptability and although it is not the most spoken language in the world, it is spoken as a first language by around 400 million people worldwide and also the most common second language in the world.

The American author, Ralph Waldo Emerson said, "The English language is the sea which receives tributaries from every region under heaven", emphasising how English has been enriched by the inclusion of words from various languages and also underlining the English language's adaptability and diversity.
